Regarding application PA1004 - Washwell Fields

The proposed site is in the grounds of a Grade II listed building and development would harm its character and alter its historic or architectural interest significantly, materially affecting the aspect of the property including potential removal of mature trees which are in excess of 100 years old and are home to owls and other wildlife.

Access to the field is very restricted, any access from Lower Washwell Lane would be dangerous, being:

- on a double blind bend
- accessed from a narrow road
- on a significant gradient
- at a point with very limited paving and used by many pedestrians, including many school children, putting them at even greater risk
- adjacent to the entrance to a public park, frequented by many pedestrians, especially children, but also host to a number of events weekly which generate dangerous parking already. Further developments will only exacerbate this.
- requiring the removal of a number of mature trees, predating any urban development, which would detriment the character of the area.

Whilst the proposal may not be visible from the A46, it will be visible from almost all other angles, particularly the East, materially affecting the landscape of an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty.

The local council has on repeated times, recorded in the Painswick Beacon and elsewhere, already had it's attention drawn to dangerous overcrowded vehicular parking in this road and to emergency service access, particularly by the fire service.

The land composition is heavily clay with spring waters underground. The four recent builds, including the East and West houses in Lower Washwell Lane, required significant pile driving to be undertaken.

The proposal for detached dwellings will inevitably mean the building of premium properties which is unlikely to do anything to address the issues you face of the need for social housing (the one in four (low cost to premium) policy will have impact in addressing this).

For similar reasons another application earlier this year for land owned by Hindes Farm was rejected. It may be worth reconsidering this option?

Note: this proposed development was only made aware to me, an owner of adjacent land, courtesy of the Painswick Beacon, an independent publisher, two weeks ago. This enquiry has been ongoing since June and as such calling this a public consultation is somewhat untrue. Is it necessary to request a public enquiry via the Planning Inspectorate to ensure consultation is communicated efficiently to those in the immediate vicinity?
