In the Dursley and Cam area facilities and services are concentrated in the south of the area and include the Dursley shopping centre, the hospital at Littlecombe and the Rednock secondary school. However the focus for major development is on green fields to the North and East at an ever increasing distance from the centre.

The unchanged settlement limits in the Local Plan and the extremely tight interpretation of the limit risks sterilise potential development sites, which are much closer to facilities and more sustainable than the extended ribbon development of the settlement, albeit these are smaller than the large strategic sites to the North. Nevertheless such sites can make an important contribution to residential, affordable and homes for the elderly

Such sites are sterilised from consideration as they are in whole or in part outside the current settlement boundary. The settlement boundary as drawn has not been revised for a very long time even though significant changes have been made. For example the Littlecombe development is close to the Eastern settlement boundary and already 50+ houses have been built outside of the settlement boundary. This was agreed prior to approval of the SDC Local Plan and yet no change was made to the settlement boundary. The result of this extension beyond the settlement boundary has been to create pockets of land which may justify a realignment of the boundary were a revison to be undertaken. It is noted that devlopment of such sites can move forward more quickly than the large strategic developments meeting needs at an earlier date.

Whilst this comment has been informed by a detailed knowledge of the Cam and Dursley settlement (in which I have lived for 40 years), it is likely to be valid for other settlements across the SDC area.

it is recommended that in tier 1 settlements at least settlement boundaries are reviewed with a view to identifying possible sustainable sites which can meet the Plan needs for affordable housing, housing for the elderly and/or residential development.
