

# **Empty commercial units in Painswick**

In recent years there has been an increase in empty commercial properties around Painswick which does not give a welcoming experience to visitors. In many cases the empty units are linked to the accommodation above and with people living in that accommodation the local Councils are unable under current regulations to take any action. The Parish Council does put what pressure it can on landlords to try and fill the vacant shops below but they cannot be forced to. Perhaps they are waiting to get change of use to residential in years to come .

One possibility would be for the Parish Council to recommend change of use to residential; however the present policy of the Council is that it would consider each application for any change of use on its merit, as they feel it is important to keep some shops available for retail businesses to come into Painswick.


## Uncertain future for tourism in Painswick No date for re-opening of The Falcon as Cardynham House opts out

With much of Britain gearing up for a boom in domestic tourism and 'staycations', Painswick is facing something of a crisis in its accommodation and hospitality sector, with two of what have previously been its main providers staying resolutely closed.


Major works for the alteration of Cardynham House have been approved and are now being carried out, and a new application has been submitted for a change of use from its current permission as a hotel and restaurant, to residential use. It has been in use as a shop and/or restaurant at least since 1861. The application follows a similar one from the former Olivas in Friday Street that is still awaiting a decision.



Meanwhile uncertainty hangs over the future of the Falcon Hotel, with no new tenant



The Falcon is a substantial business, with 11 bedrooms as well as the pub / restaurant side. It has been a significant employer in Painswick as well as an important social centre, and has been providing accommodation for visitors and refreshment for locals for probably well over 400 years, since Tudor times, although it was out of use and boarded up for a period in 1995.

#### ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

Chairman Martin Slinger opened the Meeting welcoming his 4 fellow Cllrs, the Clerk and Deputy Clerk, who had remotely joined the Meeting.

Parish Council The Chairman read his report in which he conveyed, on behalf of the local community, the deepest sympathy to Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth  $\Pi$  and the rest of the Royal Family following the death of the Duke of Edinburgh. He then went on to praise the Community's willingness to help each other during the pandemic which he described as "nothing short of marvellous" and paid particular thanks to the Painswick Covid Community Support Group (now the Painswick Support Group) whose message was "no one would be left to cope alone and assistance was just a phone call away." Many other issues were addressed and the full report is available on the Parish Council website.

Community Library. Cllr Roey Parker read her report in which she confirmed that whilst the library was closed during "lockdown" a considerable number of under-used books had been withdrawn and these had been offered free of charge to anyone able to access the Town Hall. Over 100 of the books have found a new home. From early April a restricted number of customers were allowed into the library and, if Covid allows, a full

that was not read to the Meeting. In the report they confirmed that they have recently merged with a similar but larger Charity and would shortly be changing their name. During the Pandemic they had worked hard to provide opportunities for children and young people to remain connected with each other, to engage with sport and remain in a good mental state. They appreciated the assistance of the Parish Council in allowing Psalms to use the pavilion and other facilities around the area.
