## Welcome to Stratford Park - Seven Time Green Flag Award Winner

Whatever the reason for your visit, take time to explore this historic park and enjoy the rich variety within its boundaries. Everything is easily accessible and close at hand.



### Leisure Centre

A well-used, fully equipped leisure centre with indoor pool, fitness suites, sports halls, outdoor tennis courts and a café. The centre also provides a venue for entertainment events.



### Museum in the Park

Explore the rooms of the historic listed Stratford Park Mansion House, that now house exhibitions about the heritage of the area. A modern building attached to the mansion, contains a visitor reception area and two galleries for temporary exhibits and events. The museum is free to enter.



### Lake and Grounds

Take time to explore or relax within the varied landscape of Stratford Park. The Park has an arboretum with wonderful specimen trees, a woodland walk, lake, pond, plenty of green spaces and colourful flower and shrub borders. Let the award winning, beautiful grounds captivate you with their magic. The different habitats attract a variety of wildlife species all year round and more species are being encouraged with conservation projects like the pond and an active nest box scheme.



### Arboretum

There are some very fine specimens of trees from all over the world in the arboretum. A guide to the trees is available in the museum. The arboretum merges seamlessly with the rest of the parkland and woodland.



### Woodland Trail

Tall conifers combine with deciduous trees to create a shady woodland with riverside walks. The Park has its area of beech wood, carpeted with wild garlic in the spring, mirroring the woodlands of the nearby Cotswold scarp.



### Children's Play Area

Wide open spaces and a variety of play structures mean that children can run and play safely in the children's play area. Sited on the slope above the leisure centre there are views of the surrounding countryside towards Painswick, along the Golden Valley and to Rodborough Common.
